eldercare communities, hospitals, etc. The VDT assists skilled nursing home staff to better identify with residents in an effort to improve care by "walking in the shoes" of dementia patients. For example, using dark glasses to dim the vision or wearing earphones with static to simulate the way many of these elders experience the world. SGM was one of 169 certified nursing homes whose staff has benefited from this program recently.

old water loop system of heating and air conditioning with new individual heating and air units. "This is a major project, involving electrical, plumbing and concrete cutters," said Eddie Alsobrook, Maintenance Supervisor. "The water lines of the old system were in bad shape due to the age of the pipes," he continued. Now each of the building's 107 rooms will have its own unit which can be individually controlled. And if there's a problem with a unit, it can quickly and easily be replaced. "The residents will be more comfortable in the summer **and** winter," he concluded. The installations should be completed this spring.

You may have noticed stone cutting and other work at SGM in the past few months. It's because we are replacing the
